The Gospel of Mark for the 1st Sunday of Lent Year B presents a compelling juxtaposition to the story of Noah with Jesus' temptation in the wilderness.

This narrative is rich in symbolism, portraying Jesus as the new Adam who, unlike His predecessors, withstands the temptations of Satan. His time in the wilderness, among wild beasts and attended by angels, echoes the harmony of

Dear brothers and sisters,

As we begin the first week of Lent, we are called to deepen our spiritual lives and draw closer to God. One of the most powerful ways we can do this is through prayer. May we all find the time and space to engage in this important spiritual practice during this season of Lent.

Lord Jesus, During Lent, I seek spiritual renewal and a deeper connection with you. Fill me with your Holy Spirit, cleanse my heart, and draw me closer to your love and grace.

2024 Lenten Liturgical Guidelines Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston

Lent is a special season within the Church year that focuses on the two-fold theme of repentance and Baptism. We prepare ourselves to celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Christ.

Abstinence is observed by everyone 14 years of age or older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or the ability to work is affected, the law does not apply. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.



February 17-18, 2024 DID YOU KNOW? Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston

Questions have been asked consistency with postures (standing vs. kneeling vs. sitting). In an attempt to answer some of these questions, information has been gathered from the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. That information will be shared with you in the coming weeks.

This week we share information on proper posture at Mass which was promulgated by +Bernard W. Schmitt in 2003. In the coming weeks we will look more closely into the postures of standing, sitting, kneeling and some gestures during Mass.

Proper Posture of the Congregation at Mass



Next weekend we will review the posture of STANDING in depth.

+Bernard W. Schmitt Most Reverend Bernard W. Schmitt Bishop of Wheeling-Charleston November, 2003

"The who question of posture reminds us that the nature of the Mass is to be an act of the whole people gathered together as one. The actions and the posture of the faithful should be a visible sign of their unity in faith and spirit. For this reason, the liturgical posture and actions of the faithful are best called communal (not public). Within this communal action there are profoundly personal moments; indeed, within the communion of faith, the communal is personal and the personal is communal. The structure of the Liturgy takes this reality into account, balancing moments of silent reflection with moments of communal prayer and response. Similarly, the balancing of the communal and the personal are reflected in posture; there are times when all are called to do the same thing and times when personal expressions are allowed."

SITTING (USCCB)

Sitting is the posture of listening and meditation, so the congregation sits for the pre-Gospel readings and the homily and may also sit for the period of meditation following Communion. All should strive to assume a seated posture during the Mass that is attentive rather than merely at rest.

STANDING (USCCB)

Standing is a sign of respect and honor, so we stand as the celebrant who represents Christ enters and leaves the assembly. From the earliest days of the Church, this posture has been understood as the stance of those who have risen with Christ and seek the things that are above. When we stand for prayer, we assume our full stature before God, not in pride but in humble gratitude for the marvelous things God has done in creating and redeeming each one of us. By Baptism we have been given a share in the life of God, and the posture of standing is an acknowledgment of this wonderful gift. We stand for the proclamation of the Gospel, which recounts the words and deeds of the Lord. (USCCB)

Roasted Veggie Pasta

Ingredients

¹/₄ pound fresh asparagus
2 red bell pepper, sliced
¹/₄ pound crimini mushrooms, sliced
10 cloves roasted garlic, chopped
¹/₂ tomato, quartered
¹/₂ teaspoon chopped fresh rosemary
¹/₂ teaspoon chopped fresh oregano
2 tablespoons olive oil
8 ounces dry fettuccini noodles
¹/₄ cup grated Parmesan cheese
2 tablespoons tapenade



• Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Prepare asparagus by trimming woody base and cutting diagonally into 4 inch pieces.

- In a roasting pan, combine asparagus, bell pepper, mushrooms, roasted garlic and tomato. Sprinkle with rosemary and oregano, then drizzle with olive oil. Bake in preheated oven for 15 minutes.
- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain. Toss with Parmesan cheese, tapenade and roasted vegetables.


