
Many people, perhaps most people, have had a religious experience of some sort, something akin to that of Peter, James, and John atop the mountain with Jesus. It may or may not have included hearing a voice. Most often it is a deep sense of God's presence beyond anything they have ever known, like a profound realization of what life is about or how it is laced through and through with God. It usually occurs as we are idle, not doing anything in particular, and often when we are younger, yet it is also something that changes our understanding of what life and God are about.

Most people do not talk about such experiences for any number of reasons, partly because there do not seem to be words to describe such a moment in a way anyone would understand, like trying to describe falling in love. Partly because if we tried, we fear others would think us strange. And partly because we can find ourselves wondering whether it was real or simply our imagination. Yet always we remember the moment and know it to be true.

One additional characteristic of such moments is that they tend to take us to a new place in life, as with Abram in the first reading. For him it was to pack up his life and move. More likely for us it is to a life of service, caring, and treasuring all of life now in a new way. ●



Second Sunday of Lent



Dear loving brothers and sisters in Christ,

The readings for the 2nd Sunday of Lent focus on our personal encounter with God. In the first reading, we hear how Abraham encountered God and trusted in the call. Abraham is called by God to leave his home and kin and go to an unknown land. In an act of great trust, he obeys. He does not know what lies ahead, but he walks in faith. We must also walk in faith, especially during our Lenten journey.

In the second reading Paul writes a letter to Timothy from jail, extending the challenge “bear your hardship for the Gospel.” The second reading reminds us that God is always present in our lives, giving us strength.

In our gospel this Sunday, Jesus brings his disciples away from the noise and business of everyday life and takes them up a mountain to pray. The gospel recounts the story of the Transfiguration, when Peter, James, and John encountered Jesus in all of his glory. They experience the divine presence in the transformed Jesus Christ. Jesus is changed in a very dramatic way; he is transformed beyond all recognition. *His face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light.* Imagine the surprise and shock of those who were with Jesus.

As we continue our Lenten journey, Jesus continues his own journey towards Jerusalem. He knows he will be betrayed, denied, condemned and crucified. Perhaps he feels and senses the disciples fear and anxiety and so wants to reassure them. Jesus gives them a glimpse of things to come; he is revealed to them in all his glory. Maybe this brief glimpse of Jesus in all his glory is also meant for us. Like many who have gone before us, we too experience fear, doubt and even a lack of faith. I believe each of us need to be encouraged and strengthened by Jesus, especially as we continue our Lenten journey. Lent is challenging! Many of us may be tempted to give up and give in. Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus seeing him as changed and transformed. His holy transformation gives us great hope as we see him in the future that is promised to us.

In conclusion, these readings remind us of our call to holiness, that God keeps his promises, that God is always present in our lives, that we will encounter hardships, and to trust in God!

This week, let us ponder these questions:

- Do I hear Gods call in my life and am I willing to listen to Him?
- Do I recognize Jesus when I encounter him on a daily basis?
- Can I think of a significant event where I encountered the divine presence?
- What obstacles might prevent you from receiving more from Jesus? Lack of time? Fear? My personal priorities?

Let us pray:

Lord, grant us simplicity of faith and a generosity of service that gives without counting cost. A life overflowing with Grace poured out from the One who gave everything

that we might show the power of love to a broken world and share the truth from a living Word. Lord, grant us simplicity of faith and a yearning to share it. Amen.

Second Sunday of Lent: Clothed in Light



THE GRACE I SEEK: to believe that Jesus will transform my whole being in himself

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Jesus, the Lord of Life, has given himself to you in the Eucharist. He is gazing upon you, his beloved child, with great love at this very moment. Pause for a few moments and wonder at his gift for you. Allow yourself to rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to trust you to envelop me daily with your light and grace.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — *Read slowly, 3-4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.*

“The LORD said to Abram: ‘Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your father’s house to a land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, so that you will be a blessing.’” (Genesis 12:1-2)

REFLECTION QUESTION — *Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.*

As you continue this journey of Lent, how has the Lord revealed his blessings to you? Recall concrete examples of the physical and spiritual blessings he has showered upon you. How do these blessings transform your heart so that you are a blessing to others?

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — *Read slowly, 3-4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.*

“Jesus took Peter, James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light. [...] Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, ‘Lord, it is good that we are here.’” (Matthew 17:1-2, 4)

REFLECTION QUESTION — *Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.*

The Lord leads us to a place of intimacy with himself, and in that intimacy he transforms us in his light and goodness. Gazing upon the Eucharist, ask Jesus to lead you to intimacy with his heart. Rest in that heart, and say with the disciples, “Lord, it is good that I am here.”

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, who have commanded us to listen to your beloved Son, be pleased, we pray, to nourish us inwardly by your word, that, with spiritual sight made pure, we may rejoice to behold your glory. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. (Collect, Second Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your longing to be clothed in Christ so that you become a blessing to others, just like Jesus.





Taco Salad With Fritos

Ingredients

- 1 Fritos original corn chips bag 10.5 oz
- 6 cups romaine lettuce, washed and chopped
- 2 1/2 cups Mexican blend shredded cheese
- 1 tomato, diced
- 1/2 cup red onion, iced
- 16 oz can pinto beans, rinsed and drained
- 1/2 cup black olives, sliced
- 1 cup salsa
- 1 can southwest corn 15.25 oz

Guacamole Ingredients:

- 2 ripe avocados
- 1/2 cup plain Greek yogurt
- 2 Tbsp lime juice
- 2 Tbsp tomatoes, diced
- 2 Tbsp red onions, diced
- 1/4-1/2 tsp salt (to taste)

Instructions

1. Slice your avocados in half and remove the pits and skins. In a bowl, mash your avocados with a potato masher.
2. Stir in your Greek yogurt, tomatoes, red onions, lime juice, and salt, and set the guacamole aside.
3. Using clean hands, crush half your bag of Fritos chips and place them into the bottom on your trifle dish.
4. Spread 3 cups of your romaine lettuce on top of your Frito chips layer. Top your lettuce with the pinto beans.
5. Spread your corn out evenly on top of that. Pour your salsa on top of your corn.
6. Add 2 cups of your shredded cheese on top of your salsa.

In case of illness: Please call the parish office to let us know if you, a family member, or a parishioner is sick. We can place your name on the prayer list. If requested, Fr. Sebastian will arrange for distributing Holy Communion in the home.

Nursing homes, rehabilitation centers and anyone who is hospitalized are not permitted to contact the church. If someone you know is in the hospital, please call the church office.

In case of serious or life threatening sickness or the actively dying: The church should be contacted as soon as possible. People deserve the opportunity to confess their sins, profess their faith, be anointed, and receive Holy Communion – the foretaste and pledge of eternal life. PLEASE don't wait until after the person is unconscious or so sedated that he or she cannot communicate. It is imperative with current situations, that there be enough time for Fr. to go through the appropriate protocol to visit the actively dying.

Dear Padre,

What is the value of lighting a candle in church?

Lighting candles is one of many customs that can be found in most of the world's religions. Lit candles, in church or at home, in front of a picture or statue of a favorite saint, serve a symbolic function. The light of the candle represents our desire that our prayer may be constant, as St. Paul urged (1 Thessalonians 5:17). The candle burns while we go about our daily tasks, symbolizing our desire to be at prayer with God. Similarly, Tibetan Buddhists spin prayer wheels and believe that as long as the wheels spin, a prayer is offered. Candles give light and banish the darkness. For Catholics they symbolize the light of Christ, by whose death and resurrection we are saved.

Lighting a candle isn't a required act. You can pray without lighting candles, without statues, without anything but your faith in God. However, we Catholics love our symbols. We like to engage all of our senses in our prayer experience: beautiful churches, colored light, incense, great music and, yes, candles.

One extreme position to avoid is lighting a candle hoping it will cause something else to happen, like the sudden cure of a loved one or relief from financial ruin. We are to avoid all appearance of using candles as if they have an untapped, magical power. Nevertheless, lighting a candle as a part of our prayer is a comforting custom and most things (and people?) look lovelier by candlelight. ●
