Confronted by a social obligation I would prefer to avoid, I frequently find myself musing that the timing is right for me to break a leg or get the flu. Yet more often than not, once I go, I find myself enjoying the gathering. Not all invitations are exciting or even desirable, but many become the building blocks of our lives.

When the parable of Jesus tells of an invitation to come to a wedding feast, it's really a story of our invitation to the kingdom of heaven, where, if we accept, we will dwell in the divine presence and enjoy the peace, joy, and love of God. Heaven is not only *where* we are but also *how* we are. It's an invitation to deeper and richer life—a taste of heaven, even in this life.

So it's good to consider going where we'd rather not

go. It's not simply about social gatherings, though a social gathering may be the event where you meet the person you fall in love with. It also may mean going for counseling when that may be a bit scary, or confronting one's addiction, or moving to a new city, or accepting serious and lifelong illness, or saying yes to having a child with special needs, or not getting the job you hoped for. Saying yes to what life brings may be the wedding garment that enriches our lives. It may be saying yes to God. ●

THEMES FOR THE 28TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

The readings for the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A tell of the abundance of the Kingdom of God. In the first reading we hear of the wonders of the Mountain of the Lord. The psalm tells of how God will care for us as a shepherd cares for his sheep. The second reading speaks of

how God provides for us in abundance. And in the gospel Jesus compares the Kingdom of Heaven to a lavish wedding banquet.

Kingdom as a Feast: The parable describes the Kingdom of Heaven as a wedding banquet thrown by a king. This theme visualizes the divine realm as a celebratory and communal event.

Invitation Rejected: Initially invited guests refuse the call, illustrating how some might reject or ignore divine invitations. This reflects the theme of human indifference or hostility to divine outreach.

Open Invitation: The king extends the invitation to everyone, both good and bad. This emphasizes God’s inclusivity and the universal nature of the divine call.

Unprepared Guest: A guest without a wedding robe faces consequences, suggesting that while the invitation is open, certain preparations or transformations are expected for full participation.

Introduction to Catechesis

"(T)he definitive aim of catechesis is to put people not only in touch, but also in communion and intimacy, with Jesus Christ" (GDC #90, NDC p55 and CCC #426). This course focuses on the processes and methods that will help the catechist to minister in light of this statement. We will examine appropriate methods, planning, the process, importance, ministry and vocation of catechesis in light of the Vatican II call for its renewal. This course will be of help to all those involved in catechetical work and is part of the certificate for catechesis program for the Diocese. Course material includes the National Directory for Catechesis and online material. We will meet weekly over Zoom on Wednesday evenings at 7pm for lecture and discussion.

Ecclesiology: The Beginnings of the Church

Becoming familiar with the earliest layer of Christian Church, the living community who received the revelation of Christ’s life, death and resurrection, is an essential element in understanding the Vatican II Church today. We will trace the development of the First Century Church, focusing on its contribution to our theology of Church today. Our conversation in this session will take into account the current Synod on Synodality as part of our discussion. All materials are to be found online and we will meet on Zoom Monday evenings at 7pm.

NOMINATIONS NOW OPEN

We will begin the Parish Council nomination process the weekend of – October 14 & 15. Parish Council is an integral part of our Parish community. A council member represents the PARISH and considers not only personal thoughts and wishes but what is spiritually best for the parish. The council is most importantly an advisory board to the Priest. As a council member you may be called upon to volunteer and lead events. Parish Council oversees and organizes the Parish Picnic, and other events as directed by our Priest. A council member should be open to discussion concerning all matters which may affect our community, be willing to speak with fellow parishioners and bring their thoughts to the meetings. As a council member you are elected for a three-year term. Our council has nine members, with three members retiring this year and three new members to be elected.

Dear Padre,

My prayer-group leader is encouraging us to write our own prayers for our meetings. Don't you need some formal religious training to write prayers? Will our prayers count?

It's given to every human being to be able to pray. On the level of the spiritual life, prayer is as basic as breathing is to physical life. Everyone at every moment has the grace to say a prayer.

Sometimes I ask people, "Do you pray?" At times they tell me they don't. Then I ask them, "Well, do you talk with God?" And most answer, "Of course." That's praying.

When writing your prayers, I suggest you use this ancient definition as inspiration: Prayer is the raising of the mind and heart to God. I'm sure your prayers will be that in word and feeling, and they will count.

When writing more formal prayers, it's nice to include the prayer elements the Church considers important: adoration of God, contrition and sorrow for sin, thanksgiving for life and for God's care of us in good times and bad, and petition for what we desperately need in our poverty. And for you, a final word. Remember that no matter how bad things may get, no matter how out of control things feel, you always have the gift and power of saying a prayer. Especially in time of temptation—when things really go bad—ask Mary your Mother to pray with you. ●

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A WORD FROM POPE FRANCIS
