



Coming of Age, Coming of Faith

It is said we never become a believer before age thirty-five. I don't think there is anything magical about that age. Some in their seventies still have not yet come to be people of faith, and there are those who, at a very young age, seem to have entrusted their lives to God. What the age of thirty-five does say, however, is that most people need to have lived a while and experienced a few ups and downs to recognize there is a power in their lives greater than themselves.

This week's Gospel story of the man born blind encapsulates a lifelong journey of coming to see who Jesus is, compressed into a few days. When asked who cured him of blindness, the man first says the man Jesus did it. Brought to testify before the Pharisees, he says that Jesus must be a prophet. Confronted by the

Pharisees a second time, he testifies that Jesus must be of God. Finally, when he sees Jesus again, he calls him Lord, a name for God. The story is a parable of sorts about how we come to have faith, to see with new and different eyes.


Faith involves trusting, sometimes trusting an unseen Power who feels absent at times; about surrendering control over our lives to God, as we come to see in an entirely new way. It can take a lifetime to begin seeing in such a way. ●

Fourth Sunday of Lent



Dear loving Sacred Heart Family,

This week we celebrate the fourth Sunday of Lent. We are over halfway through our Lenten journey. If you are struggling, no worries, you still have time to refresh and renew your Lenten promises and practices. Be gentle with yourself. It is a journey; everyone will experience it differently.

The theme this week is about sight and blindness and invites us to see with God's eyes. The first reading is the story of David being chosen as God's anointed one. Samuel is told that God does not see as man sees. Man sees the appearance, but the

LORD looks into the heart. The Book of Samuel challenges us to step outside of the ordinary and comfortable way of seeing and learn to focus our sight through the lens of faith.

In the second reading, from Paul to the Ephesians, Paul reminds us that we should live as the children of light: "Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness; rather expose them, for it is shameful even to mention the things done by them in secret; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light." The light of faith in Christ Jesus warms our tepid hearts and calls us out of our spiritual hibernation.

In the Gospel, the healing of the blind man is significant and a teachable moment. In ancient times it was unheard of someone restoring the sight of a blind person. Through the Gospel, we hear Jesus' response to a prevalent belief of his time: that misfortune and disability were the result of sin. Jesus wants to make clear that sinfulness and sickness are not synonymous. However, that does not mean that we cannot make ourselves sick with sin! We must always be aware of our own propensity to sin through our thoughts, words, habits, and actions. It is easy to close our eyes and turn our heads when it comes to our own sin, but we see with a very critical eye when it comes to our neighbor's sin. Let us not fool ourselves: What is most important, is how God sees!

So, how *does* God see? God does not give value to our appearance, our age, finances, or stature in life. Thankfully, God loves us blindly heart and soul. Our challenge this week is to think deeply about sight and blindness, light and dark, and how we see others and ourselves:

Do I sometimes judge or stereotype others because of their appearance, culture, wealth, sex, or because of their differences?

What issue in my life today needs to be examined through God's eyes?

In what parts of my life is the darkness of sin blinding me?

What steps am I taking this Lent to remain in the Light of Christ.

This season of Lent invites us to see with God's eyes that we are no longer in darkness. Instead, we live in Christ our Light! Our own arrogance, prejudice, anger, jealousy, and ego will eventually cause us spiritual blindness. However, if we begin to reflect Christ through practicing faith, hope, and love; he will restore us with His Holy vision. We pray for light and vision in our own lives and in our Church. May our heavenly Father continue to guide and enlighten us giving us courage to see His divine reality that surrounds us. We also pray for those who continue to walk and live in darkness. May the holy light of God shine upon them, illuminating their hearts, casting out the darkness, and opening their eyes to see Jesus, their loving and compassionate Savior!

Fourth Sunday of Lent: Jesus Heals



THE GRACE I SEEK: to believe that Jesus longs to bring me healing and strength

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Jesus, the Lord of Life, has given himself to you in the Eucharist. He is gazing upon you, his beloved child, with great love at this very moment. Pause for a few moments and wonder at his gift for you. Allow yourself to rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to believe you are longing to transform my life with your healing.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — *Read slowly, 3-4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.*

“Not as man sees does God see, because man sees the appearance, but the LORD looks into the heart.’ [...] Then Samuel, with the horn of oil in hand, anointed David in the presence of his brothers; and from that day on, the spirit of the LORD rushed upon David.” (1 Samuel 16:7b, 13a)

REFLECTION QUESTION — *Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.*

Knowing that Jesus sees into the recesses of the heart, where in your heart is Christ’s healing needed the most? Is there a place in your heart where you have never allowed the Lord to go? Ask Jesus for the grace to allow his spirit to “rush” upon that place to heal any wounds or sickness hidden there.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — *Read slowly, 3-4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.*

“They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. [...] So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, ‘He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see.’” (John 9:13, 15)

REFLECTION QUESTION — *Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.*

Jesus, the Good Physician, knows our weaknesses of body, heart, and mind. He longs to heal us in ways we cannot imagine. Gazing upon the Eucharist, ask Jesus to help you “see” his providential care; Ask for the eyes to recognize his healing presence in your life, and thank him for this healing.

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, who through your Word reconcile the human race to yourself in a wonderful way, grant, we pray, that with prompt devotion and eager faith the Christian people may hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. (Collect, Fourth Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your desire for spiritual healing.

A Spring Clean-Up is planned for the outside of the church on Saturday, April 22





15 minute mushroom stroganoff

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp oil
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 500 g (~ 17 ½ oz) mushrooms, sliced or diced
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- 70 ml (~ ¼ cup) vegetable stock
- 2 tbsp sour cream
- Salt
- Black pepper
- 4 tbsp fresh parley, chopped

Instructions

1. Heat the oil in a large frying pan or wok, and add the onion. Cook for a few minutes over a medium heat, until slightly softened. Add the garlic and sliced mushrooms, and cook for a further 5 minutes, or until the mushrooms are thoroughly cooked.
2. Coat the mushrooms in the smoked paprika, then add the vegetable stock and sour cream. Bring to a gentle simmer, and

cook until the mixture has come together into a silky sauce.

3. Season to taste, and serve topped with plenty of fresh parsley.

Nursing homes, rehabilitation centers and anyone who is hospitalized are not permitted to contact the church. If someone you know is in the hospital, please call the church office.

In case of serious or life threatening sickness or the actively dying: The church should be contacted as soon as possible. People deserve the opportunity to confess their sins, profess their faith, be anointed, and receive Holy Communion – the foretaste and pledge of eternal life. PLEASE don't wait until after the person is unconscious or so sedated that he or she cannot communicate. It is imperative with current situations, that there be enough time for Fr. to go through the appropriate protocol

Dear Padre,

Why should I bother to be more religious? I'm a good person. Isn't that enough to get me into heaven?

When asked for advice about how people should decide on a vocation, St. Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, said they should do an imagination exercise. "Imagine that you are on your deathbed," he said. "From that point of view what would you wish you had done in your life?" That is still good advice.

Here's another exercise: Imagine you have a grandmother who is completely generous and caring toward you. Throughout your childhood, she was always there for you. But as a teen you belittled her and, in effect, told her that all she had offered is worthless to you. In a saner moment, won't you feel terrible about how you treated her?

Our life with God is much the same. God has given us absolutely everything, from our existence to every breath we take. God has also given us a way to know him through his Son, Jesus (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 73). And one way we know Jesus is through the Church and the celebration of the sacraments (CCC 1085). To refuse these gifts, to say, "I am already a good person. I don't need these gifts from God" is a bit presumptuous, don't you think?

To be "religious" is not just an outward show of piety. It's the way we have been given to learn God's language: the language of forgiveness, of faith, hope, and love. ●
