

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we approach the third week of Lent, the readings for this Sunday bring us a message of hope, forgiveness, and the promise of salvation. We will also reflect upon the third pillar of Lent: the importance of almsgiving.

In the first reading from Exodus, we hear of the Ten Commandments, which remind us of the importance of living a just and righteous life. In the second reading, Paul preaches Christ crucified to the Corinthians. We are called to reflect on the power of the cross and the sacrifice that Christ made for our salvation. In the Gospel reading from John, Jesus drives out the moneychangers from the Temple and says that he will destroy the temple and raise it up again. Jesus' cleansing of the temple is also a symbol of the purification of the heart. As Christians, we are called to strive for purity of heart, which means being mindful of our thoughts, words, and actions and ensuring they align with God's will. We also see the importance of the temple as a place of worship and prayer. As Catholics, we believe that Jesus is present in the Eucharist and that we enter into God's presence every time we participate in Mass. The Gospel reading reminds us of the significance of the Eucharist and the importance of approaching it with reverence and awe. This also ties in with the first reading, reminding us to keep the Sabbath holy.

As we continue our journey through Lent, we are called to practice almsgiving, one of the three pillars of our Lenten observances. This practice involves giving generously to those in need and supporting charitable causes. We can give during Lent in various ways, such as donating money to a charity or volunteering our time to help those in need. The Lenten call to almsgiving means making other people's needs our own. One of the central lessons of the cross is compassion; the heavy burdens we carry help us to appreciate the suffering in others. Sharing our material goods is often just the beginning of honest Christian giving. We are also called to share our time tending to people in need.

Let us pray that we may have the strength and courage to give generously to those around us. May we be mindful of the less fortunate and find ways to alleviate their suffering. May we also be grateful for the blessings in our lives and use them to bring joy and comfort to others.

Praying in Unison The Sign of Peace

PRAYING IN UNISON (Sung or Spoken)

Maintain a standing prayerful posture.

When assuming a prayerful standing posture the body is upright with <u>prayer hands</u> above the waist (hands should not be draped over the pew rail).





There are times during Holy Mass when we stand. It is the times we stand to sing, speak and pray together that we will review today.

At the beginning of Mass we make the Sign of the Cross.

Penitential Prayer:

after "what I have failed to do" – strike your breast three times as you say through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault;\

Kyrie (sung or spoken)

Gloria (sung or spoken)

Responsorial Psalm (sung or spoken)

Nicene Creed

...after 'he came down from heaven to including became man' all bow (bow from the waist).

The Lord's Prayer (most of the time spoken)

Lamb of God (sung or spoken)

Lord, I am not worthy (spoken)

At the close of Mass we make a Sign of the Cross

<u>SIGN OF PEACE</u> +Mark E. Brennan, Bishop of Wheeling-Charleston, March 1, 2023

Another part of our sacred liturgy that has been deeply affected by the COVID-19 pandemic is the Sign of Peace. If you recall, prior to the pandemic we were encouraged to greet those around us with a handshake or a gentle embrace. I have decided to allow both "tactile" and "non-tactile" gestures. This is also a timely opportunity to catechize the faithful on the liturgical meaning of this moment within the liturgy. Remind the assembly that this is not a time for "Hello, how are you doing?" or "Good morning!" Rather we are bestowing one another with the Peace of Christ. In the Gospel of John (14:27), Jesus makes it clear that the peace that he bestows on us, that we in turn share with one another, is not as the world gives. The Church tells us that "It is appropriate that each person, in a sober manner, offer the sign of peace only to those nearest to them" (GIRM, #82).

Note: The Sign of Peace is <u>NOT</u> the "V" sign across the Church. It is the 'PEACE OF CHRIST – the peace that the world cannot give." <u>It should either be a nod "Peace be with you" or shake hands or a gentle embrace.</u> (Bernadette McMasters Kime. Ph.D, D. Min, Director Office of Worship and Sacraments, DWC)

Eucharistic Reflection: The Gift:


At the Mass of the Lord's Supper celebrated on Holy Thursday, the priest prays these words:

For he is the true and eternal Priest, who instituted the pattern of an everlasting sacrifice and was the first to offer himself as the saving Victim, commanding us to make this offering as his memorial. As we eat his flesh that was sacrificed for us, we are made strong.

and, as we drink his Blood that was poured out for us, we are washed clean.

The words of the liturgy on the night the Church commemorates the institution of the Eucharist speak to us of the Mass as the re-presentation of Christ's unique sacrifice on the Cross, the reception of Christ truly present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and the marvelous effects of communion in those who receive gift.6

Laetare Sunday: The fourth Sunday of Lent marks the halfway point between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Rose-colored vestments may be worn in place of the normal purple, in honor of the word "laetare," or "be joyful," which comes from the Introit at Mass. In addition, the "golden rose" is traditionally blessed on this Sunday. The golden rose is a gold ornament, blessed by the pope during Mass and later given as a sign of reverence or affection to churches, governments or individuals. No one knows exactly when the custom began, but Pope Leo IX talked about it in 1051. No individual has been given a golden rose since the 1960s.



Pineapple Shrimp Tacos

Ingredients

- 1 pound uncooked shrimp (26-30 per pound), peeled and deveined3 teaspoons olive oil, divided
- 1 large sweet orange pepper, sliced
- 1 large sweet red pepper, sliced
- 1 small onion, halved and sliced
- 1 cup pineapple tidbits
- 1 envelope fajita seasoning mix
- 1/3 cup water
- 8 corn tortillas (6 inches), warmed
- 1/2 cup crumbled Cotija or shredded mozzarella cheese
- 8 large romaine lettuce leavesDirections



2. In the same skillet, saute the peppers, onion and pineapple in remaining oil until vegetables are tender. Add seasoning mix and the water. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Return shrimp to the skillet; heat through. Spoon mixture onto tortillas; top with cheese. Wrap lettuce around tortillas to serve.

It is imperative with current situations, that there be enough time for Fr. to go through the appropriate protocol to visit the actively dying.
