Dennis is one of the local street people who lives around the parish where I live. He is usually pleasant and courteous and wants to do things right, though he also struggles with his own set of demons. For the most part, Dennis seems to be finding his way through the mazes of life, as people do in their own fashion.

In some ways, the parishioners have become a family for Dennis, or at least a part of the family scattered about the neighborhood. Frequently he will be gone for a time, and we will wonder what happened to Dennis, only to find him drifting back among us.

These days Dennis is angry with us. For whatever reason, Dennis brought his assembled belongings and took up residence on our garage roof. The roof is flat and has a two-foot-high wall around the edge, a place that affords a bit of shelter from the wind. Soon, however, the parish came up with a list of reasons why it would be best if Dennis did not live on our garage roof—safety, security, and insurance among them. So Dennis was asked to move on, and that's why Dennis is angry with us.

The parish staff tries to be sensitive and caring about the street people. They try to let them make their own way when that is what they want to do. Yet at other times the staff needs to do what is best for everyone involved in the parish. It's not always easy to know how to love someone. ●

The readings for the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A are a call to love. The first reading tells how we are to treat other people, especially the poor, oppressed, and marginalized. The second reading reminds us that how we live should show that we are followers of Jesus. And in the gospel Jesus gives us the Great Commandment and the

Golden Rule.

Greatest Commandments:

Asked about the greatest commandment, Jesus sums up the law with love for God and neighbor. This theme focuses on the core ethical guidelines in religious practice.

Test of Understanding: The Pharisees test Jesus, making this another episode where



It is imperative with current situations, that there be enough time for Fr. to go through the appropriate protocol to visit the actively dying.

All Saints' Day FAQ

What is All Saints' Day?

All Saints' Day celebrates the feast or solemnity of all the saints in Heaven, both saints recognized by the Church as holy men and women and those who remain unknown.

When is All Saints' Day in 2023?

All Saints' Day is celebrated on November 1 every year. In 2023, All Saints' Day falls on a Wednesday.

Is All Saints' Day a holy day of obligation?

Yes, All Saints' Day is a holy day of obligation. Catholics are expected to attend Mass on All Saints' Day.

What is the difference between All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day?

All Saints' Day celebrates the holy men and women in Heaven, those known and unknown by the Church, on November 1, whereas All Souls' Day honors all of the faithful departed on November 2. In some countries, such as Mexico, people know All Souls' Day as the second day of "Día de Los Muertos."

What is the liturgical color for All Saints' Day?

The Church recognizes white as the liturgical color for All Saints' Day. The color white symbolizes the holiness and purity of the saints in Heaven.

When did All Saints' Day start?

Pope Boniface IV instituted All Saints' Day in the Church in 609 when the Roman temple of the Pantheon in Rome became a Church named the Basilica di Santa Maria ad Martyres (the Basilica of St. Mary and the Martyrs). Initially instituted in May, Pope Gregory IV moved the holy day to November two centuries later, in 837. Since then, Christians have celebrated All Saints' Day on the first day of November.

All Souls' Day Prayers for 2023

All Souls' Day falls on November 2, just one day after All Saints Day. In some Spanish-speaking countries and communities, All Souls' Day is the second day of "Día de Los Muertos" celebrations. This holy day celebrates all the faithful departed.

What is All Souls' Day?

Officially known as the "Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed," All Souls' Day is a day to celebrate, honor, and pray for all those who have died to rest peacefully with God. Many pray for their friends and family who have passed on this day. In Mexico and other Hispanic countries and communities, All Souls' Day is the second day of the famous "Día de Los Muertos" celebrations.

When is All Souls' Day in 2023?

All Souls' Day is celebrated on November 2 every year. In 2023, All Souls' Day falls on a Thursday.

What is the purpose of All Souls' Day, and why is it important?

All Souls' Day guides us in remembering our deceased loved ones, as well as praying for a peaceful journey from Purgatory to Heaven.

What is the difference between All Saints Day and All Souls' Day?

All Saints Day celebrates the holy men and women in Heaven, those known and unknown by the Church, on November 1, whereas All Souls' Day honors all of the faithful departed on November 2.

Who celebrates All Souls' Day?

All Souls' Day is mainly celebrated in Catholic, Anglican, and Orthodox Churches.

Is there Mass on All Souls' Day?

Yes, Mass is celebrated on All Souls' Day. Check with your local parish for Mass times throughout the day!

Is All Souls' Day a Holy Day of Obligation?

No, All Souls' Day is not a Holy Day of Obligation (though All Saints Day is).

What is the prayer for All Souls' Day?

People commonly pray the "Eternal Rest Prayer for the Dead" on All Souls' Day: "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and all the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen."

What are some All Souls' Day customs?

All Souls' Day is celebrated all around the world in a variety of ways. Generally speaking, All Souls' Day customs relate to celebrating your loved ones who have passed away. This could mean visiting their cemetery, lighting a candle at Mass in honor of them, or cooking a meal that reminds you of them. You could even participate in an activity they loved during their time on earth, such as playing music or a game they enjoyed.

How can I celebrate All Souls' Day?

Celebrate All Souls' Day by praying for all the faithful departed, those close to you, and those unknown. You can also attend Mass, light a candle in honor of someone in your life who passed, or learn about the traditions celebrated as part of "Día de Los Muertos."

Dear Padre,

How does a person become a saint?

Saint Alphonsus Liguori challenged those who entered the Redemptorists saying, "Don't become a Redemptorist unless you want to be a saint." I would widen his expression to say, "Don't get baptized unless you want to be a saint." To be a saint means that you want to go to heaven. Most people are not canonized, but anyone who leads a holy life is a member of the communion of saints. This mystical body spans heaven, earth, and purgatory. As St. Paul said, "We are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1).

Technically speaking, to be canonized, that is, given the title of "saint" by the Church, a person's life should serve as a model for others, and two miracles must be attributed to his or her intercession. The formal process begins after death with the creation of the person's "cause," often with the leadership of local clergy.

The beatitudes offer us a blueprint for holiness. If we are poor in spirit, mourning, meek, hungry for righteousness, merciful, pure, peacemakers, or persecuted for doing what is right, we are on the road to sainthood. Reflect on one of the beatitudes. It can be one you do well or one that challenges you. Discern how you live it out and how you could live it out better. Slowly you will find yourself growing holier, and one day you will find yourself a saint in heaven. ●
